

Overview

The 2021 NCACC County Map Book includes numerous indicators mapped in years past. There are also several new and updated maps, including some indicators that reflect data available since the public health pandemic. Almost 16 months after the first COVID-19 case was reported in the

state, there are positive signs of economic recovery, though improvement is not consistent across all regions, industries, or demographics. Some datasets include information accounting for the impact of the pandemic, though most maps reflect the most recent consecutive dataset available.

Economic

- North Carolina reported a seasonally adjusted unemployment rate of 4.8% in May 2021, a significant improvement from the May 2020 rate of 13.5%. The state's workforce experienced the sharpest impact from public health mitigation efforts in April and May last year, with the unemployment rate statewide exceeding 13% both months. The national rate in May 2021 was 5.8%.
- Counties with a focused tourism industry have seen the largest net change in unemployment over the past year, after experiencing the greatest rate increases – percentage-wise – at the beginning of the pandemic.
- The “Top Industry Employer” map shows the single employer in each county with the most employees. County government is typically one of the top employers in every county, and, as indicated on the map, the local school system is the top employer in 56 counties.
- 37 counties had a tax rate change in 2021-22, with 11 counties increasing and 26 counties decreasing their rate. 25 counties had revaluations, and the average property tax rate dropped slightly to .6717. Only 15 counties had a tax rate change one year ago, reflecting the fiscal uncertainties at the beginning of the pandemic.
- As in past years, reliable data on broadband access remains difficult to obtain and map. Efforts at the federal level and from the NC Broadband Infrastructure Office continue to work to improve accurate access and adoption information. The “Broadband Internet Subscription Rates” map shows 1 in 4 people does not have a broadband internet subscription in half of North Carolina counties.

Overview


Education

- Counties allocated almost \$3.4 billion in local county current expense (operating) funding last year, as well as \$1.4 billion in capital outlay funds and debt service.
- Enrollment figures released before the impact of COVID-19 show the number of traditional public school students remained relatively flat while the number of charter school students increased by 6%. Enrollment figures for home, private, and public schools continue to shift as a result of the pandemic.
- A new data indicator shows the number of individuals in each county that will need to attain a postsecondary credential or degree by 2030 to meet the state's educational attainment goal of 2 million.

New Data Indicators

- The “Needs-Based Public School Capital Fund” map shows the 31 counties and school systems that have received lottery funds for school construction since the Fund was established in 2017. Development tier one and two counties are currently eligible for grants, which require a local match. \$330 million in grants has been awarded to date.
- The “U.S. Census Response Rate” map displays the self-reporting response rate to the 2020 U.S. Census in each county. After a process called Nonresponse Followup and other technical methodologies were completed, the U.S. Census Bureau reported 99.98% of all housing units and addresses nationwide were accounted for in the decennial survey.
- North Carolina saw record-breaking voter turnout during the 2020 general election. The “Voter Turnout” map reflects voter turnout by county.
- The "Paycheck Protection Program Loans Per Capita" and "Extra Credit Grants Per Children Aged 16 & Younger" maps provide insight into how some of the federal coronavirus relief funds were utilized at the county level.

Local Current Expense Per Student










Students Enrolled In A Postsecondary Institution Within 12 Months



Pre-K Enrollment




Top Industry Employer

Unemployment Rate



Unemployment Rate Net Change



Average Weekly Wage



Average Income Per Capita



Paycheck Protection Program Loans Per Capita





Commuting Alone

















Total Taxable Property Per Capita









Uninsured Persons



Percentage Of Medicaid Eligible Individuals



Number Of Opiate Deaths









Mental Health Providers Ratio










