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Executive Summary

Davie County Health Department has initiatives designed to improve the health of those who live, work, learn, play, and utilize services in Davie County. Our philosophy is also a belief that every citizen of Davie County has the right to receive quality public health services that include the promotion of health, prevention of disease, and care for the sick. We recognize that many of today's social problems are too complex for one group or agency to solve alone. Davie County Health Department provides direct services to the community, and ongoing support to community partners by guiding strategy, identifying resources, and developing evaluation measures.

The Community Health Assessment (CHA) survey is a tool used to identify aspects of health and health service provision that need additional efforts and attention (or not) in Davie County. The Community Health Assessment must be conducted at least every 48 months in accordance with requirements from the N.C. Department of Health and Human Services Division of Public Health. in accordance with requirements from North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Public Health. The Community Health Assessment helps health officials, community agencies, and community at large, understand the current health status and needs of Davie County. This document will also highlight strengths, assets, and potential resources available to address identified needs.

There were 253 community health assessment surveys completed, representing a minimum of 675 residents. Most respondents (63.5%) reported having some college, a college degree, or graduate degree; and 76% reside within the Mocksville zip code. While respondents were Davie County residents, these results are not representative of the entire county population. In reviewing results and respondent demographic data, staff and committee members are committed to widening the efforts and reach of CHA surveys for the next CHA cycle.

The community health assessment committee reviewed primary and secondary data and identified recurring themes to develop three priority areas. Primary data is data obtained through community health surveys; and secondary data is obtained from other published sources. The chosen priorities are:

1. Chronic disease management
2. Drug misuse and abuse prevention and education
3. Access to affordable care.

Data and documentation provided in this report will support the three health priority areas selected.

Chapter 1 – Background and Introduction

The first step in the Community Health Assessment process is development of an assessment team to collaboratively create the health assessment tool, determine data collection methods, analyze and interpret data, and identify three health priority areas from the collective interpretation of data. The community health assessment process occurs on a three year cycle and coincides with the local hospital's community assessment timeline.

As mentioned, the Community Health Assessment was a collective and collaborative effort. Davie County Health Department partnered with representatives from local government departments, nonprofit agencies and organizations, and major health systems. This partnership was formed through Healthy Davie. The Healthy Davie Initiative was launched in December 2014 by the Davie Community Foundation and Mebane Charitable Foundation to encourage communication and collaboration among agencies and organizations to positively impact the areas of Education, Poverty, and Wellness. The vision of Healthy Davie is to achieve a "healthy community". This already-established team, focused on making Davie County a healthy community, made the perfect committee for addressing community health and health assessment efforts.

The community health assessment committee reviewed primary and secondary data and identified recurring themes to develop three priority areas. The chosen priorities are:

1. Chronic disease management
2. Drug misuse and abuse prevention and education
3. Access to affordable care.

The priorities listed will consume efforts toward protecting and improving the lives and health of Davie County residents.

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
Chapter 2 – County Description

Geography, History and Demographics Davie County

Davie is a vibrant, prosperous and dynamic county committed to building a sustainable future for generations to come, while celebrating its rural heritage and enhancing its quality of life. Davie was formed in 1836 from Rowan County and named after William R. Davie, Governor of NC in the late 1700s (1798-1799). Davie County is largely rural and characterized by rolling farmland, but best known for its friendly people, historic past, top-rated school system, unwavering patriotism, faith, and community spirit.


There are 7 townships in Davie County. The Town of Mocksville is the most populated municipality and is also the county seat. Davie County's physical area is approximately 265 square miles. The elevation of the county is 802 feet above sea level. The climate in Davie County is relatively mild, with an annual mean temperature of around 58 degrees. The average annual precipitation is around 43 inches.

Davie borders Forsyth, Davidson, Iredell, Yadkin, and Rowan Counties; and is located in central North Carolina close to Winston-Salem, Greensboro, Charlotte, and Raleigh. Davie County is bisected by I-40, with I-85 and I-77 only minutes away. In addition to Interstate connections, four (4) main highways pass through Davie County - Highways 601, 801, 158 and 64. Approximately 100% of Davie County residents live within 10 miles of a full-time four-lane highway. Davie County is served by rail transportation networks through Southern and Norfolk Southern and two international airports: Charlotte-Douglas Airport, which is located 55 minutes away in Charlotte, NC; and Piedmont Triad International Airport, 45 minutes away in nearby Greensboro. History

The region that became Davie County was settled as early as 1740, when settlers began migrating west of the Yadkin River. Carved from Rowan County in 1836, the county was named in honor of William R. Davie, a Revolutionary War Leader, governor of North Carolina, minister to France, and a leader in the founding of the University of North Carolina. According to records, a small village named “Mocks Old Field” was in existence before the American Revolution, as the area was considered to be centrally located on the main north-to-south and east-to-west routes of travel in North Carolina. Mocks Old Field was used as a secret meeting place for Colonial forces and planners, some of whom were members of Daniel Boone’s family. Daniel Boone lived in Davie County, in the fork of the Yadkin River, for about 13 years. Boone became an important explorer in opening the land across the Appalachians to settlement and paved the way for rapid development of that region. Mocksville, the county seat and the largest town in Davie County, is a historic town that was incorporated in 1839. Other incorporated towns in the county include Cooleemee, incorporated in 1985, and Bermuda Run, incorporated in 1999. Other townships include Calahaln, Clarksville, Farmington, Fulton, Jerusalem, and Shady Grove. The top agriculture products grown in Davie County include: milk, beef cattle, poultry products, timber, flue-cured tobacco, greenhouse and nursery products, soybeans and corn. Historic area attractions include the Boxwood Lodge; the Center Arbor; the Jesse Clement House; the Cooleemee Plantation; Davie County Courthouse; the former Davie County Jail; Downtown Mocksville Historic District; the Foard-Tatum House; Fulton United Methodist Church; the Hinton Rowan Helper House; the McGuire-Setzer House; North Main Street Historic District; Salisbury Historic District; and the John Edward Bell Shutt House. Chapter 3 – Health Data Collection Process

Community Health Assessment team members determined that survey dissemination and collection would be most effectively and efficiently completed through clients, contacts and staff of agencies within the county, and those represented on the assessment team. Again, assessment team members represented Davie County Health Department, Davie County Schools, Davie County Senior Services, Novant Health, Davie Medical Center -Wake Forest Baptist Health, Davie Community Foundation, Mebane Charitable Foundation, Davie County Cooperative Extension, Davie YMCA, and Town leaders. The reach of these agencies, organizations, and townships is far, and inclusive of most Davie County residents.

Davie County's Community Health Assessment survey tool was created on Survey Monkey - an online survey development and management software that includes data analysis, sample selection, and bias elimination tools. Residents/Participants could choose to complete the survey online or on paper. Surveys were emailed and/or hand delivered - and delivered to additional service agencies and organizations within the county. There were 253 health assessment surveys completed, representing a minimum of 673 residents. Residents/Participants answered questions regarding health status, health behaviors, and factors impacting quality of life. For the Spanish-speaking community, Community Health Assessment surveys were translated to Spanish and disseminated through Davie County Health Department and Saint Francis Assisi Catholic Church, where interpreter services are also provided.

In addition to primary data collection from community residents surveyed, the assessment team obtained various data points and trend information from secondary statistical sources. Secondary data provided additional information about the health and well-being of those living in Davie County. Only current and relevant data were used to create the assessment. The primary source of health related data was N.C. State Center for Health Statistics (NC SCHS). The NC SCHS compiles morbidity incidence and prevalence as well as mortality data. Health and social data is contained in the County Data Book, which is updated each year.



Davie County has consistently had a higher suicide rate than the state and nation. Davie County ranks 22nd out of 100 counties for highest suicide rate per 100,000 population. Davie County's suicide rate is 15.93 per 100,000 population as compared to North Carolina at 13.02 and United States at 13.47. The numbers represented in the graph above were collected from county death certificates. The majority of suicides are completed by older adult males at home using a gun.

Morbidity

Sexually Transmitted Infections

Gonorrhea

Gonorrhea is a sexually transmitted infection (STI) that can infect both men and women. It can cause infections in the genitals, rectum, and throat. It is most common in young people ages 15-24 years, and can be asymptomatic. If symptoms occur, they vary in men and women, depending on which part of the body is infected. Gonorrhea can also be spread from a mother to her baby during delivery. North Carolina law requires that pregnant women be screened for gonorrhea at intervals during pregnancy and that newborns receive an antibiotic prophylactic eye ointment as a preventive measure against gonorrheal conjunctivitis. The gonorrhea rates for the county have fluctuated since 2012. Our most recent number of cases was 39, which equates to a rate of 92.8/100,000*. Gonorrhea is treated with antibiotics. As with all STIs, is best to prevent infection before it occurs rather than rely on secondary treatments. (CDC Gonorrhea Factsheet)

Syphilis

Syphilis is an STI that can cause long-term complications if not treated correctly. Symptoms in adults are divided into primary, secondary, latent, and late syphilis. The infection can be acquired through direct contact with syphilis sores during vaginal, anal, or oral sex. Syphilis can also be spread from an infected mother to her unborn baby.

Syphilis can have very mild symptoms or none at all. The symptoms of syphilis can resemble those of many other diseases. These can include a painless syphilis sore that appears after initial exposure, or a non-itchy body rash that develops during the second stage on the palms of your hands and soles of your feet. Syphilis rates include primary, secondary and early latent cases, and have held steady in Davie County since 2014. The rate for 2016 equals 3.2. The county rates have been consistently lower than the state rates for the last five years. (CDC Syphilis Factsheet)

HIV/AIDS

HIV/AIDS Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) is a virus that affects specific cells of the immune system, called CD4 cells, or T cells. Over time, HIV can destroy so many of these cells that the body cannot fight off infections and disease, which may result in acquired immunodeficiency syndrome, or AIDS, in which immune systems are severely weakened. Currently, there is no effective cure. With proper medical care, HIV can be controlled with treatment called antiretroviral therapy or ART. It can dramatically prolong the lives of many people infected with HIV and lower their chance of infecting others. Today, someone diagnosed with HIV and treated before the disease is far advanced can have a nearly normal life expectancy (Center for Disease Control and Prevention). As of 12/31/2016, Davie County has 37 residents with either HIV or AIDS.

Chlamydia

Chlamydia is a common STD that can infect both men and women. It can cause serious, permanent damage to a woman's reproductive system. This can make it difficult or impossible for her to get pregnant later on. Chlamydia can also cause a potentially fatal ectopic pregnancy (pregnancy that occurs outside the womb). You can get chlamydia by having vaginal, anal, or oral sex with someone who has chlamydia. .If you've had chlamydia and were treated in the past, you can still get infected again. This can happen if you have unprotected sex with someone who has chlamydia.

Most people who have chlamydia have no symptoms. If you do have symptoms, they may not appear until several weeks after you have sex with an infected partner. Even when chlamydia causes no symptoms, it can damage your reproductive system. Some

symptoms may include: an abnormal vaginal discharge, a burning sensation when urinating, discharge from penis, pain and swelling in one or both testicles (although this is less common).

Chlamydia in Davie County has fluctuated since 2012. The rate is currently 311.8, the highest since 2012.

The following are suggestions for reducing risk of contracting all sexually transmitted infections; use condoms during all sexual acts which prevent transmission of bacteria and viruses and limit contact with sores from diseases such as syphilis, maintain a mutually monogamous relationship with a partner who has been tested and has negative STI test results, undergo regular and frequent sexually transmitted infection testing and screening, abstain from sex or reduce number of partners to prevent exposure to infections.

Heart Disease and Stroke

According to the Center for Disease Control, Heart disease is a phrase that includes a number of more specific heart conditions. Heart disease can cause heart attacks, stroke, heart failure, and an irregular heartbeat. The most common heart disease in the United States is coronary artery disease (CAD), which can lead to a heart attack when fat and other substances collect along the arterial wall and cause a hardening plaque material to buildup. This hardened plaque causes the blood vessels to become narrowed. Other risk factors that contribute to CAD are: high blood pressure, high LDL cholesterol, high triglycerides (fat), tobacco smoke, inactivity, obesity, alcohol use and diabetes mellitus. Most, if not all, of these risk factors are indeed controllable.

A stroke (also called cerebrovascular disease) happens when the blood flow to the brain is blocked or when a blood vessel in or around the brain bursts, and part of the brain starts to die. A stroke is very serious, but treatable. By knowing the symptoms of stroke and seeking immediate attention, doctors can improve chances of recovery if you get to the hospital within three hours of symptoms appearing.

According to the NC Stroke Association, every 20 minutes, someone in North Carolina is hospitalized with a stroke and every two hours someone dies from a stroke. Up to 80 percent of strokes are preventable by making healthy lifestyle changes such as, controlling high blood pressure, losing weight, and not smoking. Strokes can cause significant disability including paralysis, as well as speech and emotional problems.

The average years of life lost for heart disease and stroke in North Carolina were 7.3 and 5.4 respectively in 2009. Therefore, prevention of the risk factors that contribute to these diseases will improve the length and quality of life for those diagnosed.

Mental and Behavioral Health

In July of 2017, Davie County Health Department addressed a need and is attempting to close the mental health provider to patient ratio gap that exists. According to NC County Health Rankings (2017), Davie County has a population of 42,000 with a patient to mental health provider ratio of 2390:1. The Nest Family Counseling Center, A Division of Davie County Department of Public Health, opened its doors in July of 2017. In its first month of operation, there were more than ninety (90) referrals to the Nest.

Nest Family Counseling Center provides mental and behavioral health services to Davie County residents ages 3-18 years and their caregivers. The Nest Family Counseling Center offers an array of services and has expertise in meeting the specific needs of children and adolescents. The initial intake appointment takes place at 172 South Clement Street; Suite 1 (across from town hall). Clinical staff at the Nest bring a wealth of treatment experience, working with children and families and utilizing evidence-based practices such as Cognitive Behavioral Therapy to treat disorders related to anxiety, depression, attention deficit hyperactivity and inattentiveness, adjustment, social skills, low self-esteem, obsessiveness and compulsions, conduct difficulties, attachment, and grief and loss. Additionally, the Nest offers the first clinical team in Davie County to bring Trauma Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy, TF-CBT, as the "gold" standard for the treatment of trauma related disorders of children and adolescents. Staff members are trained and rostered in Trauma Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy through the rigorous NC Child Treatment Program. The Nest Family Counseling Center accepts Medicaid, NC Health Choice, BCBS, MedCost and most other insurances. For clients with no insurance coverage or other financial barriers, fees are determined using a sliding fee scale, which is based on income and need.

Health Care

Access to Medical Care

Davie County ranks 24th in the state (out of 100 counties) for access to care - the ratio of patients to provider for primary care physicians, dentists and mental health providers as compared to the state ratio is significant.



Overdoses in Davie County

The majority of overdoses in Davie County occur among individuals age 20-49, and primarily from opioids. Opioids are a class of drugs that include the illegal drug heroin, synthetic opioids such as fentanyl, and pain relievers available legally by prescription, such as oxycodone, hydrocodone (Vicodin®), codeine, morphine, and many others. (www.drugabuse.gov/drugs-abuse/opioids)

Project Lazarus, a community-based drug overdose prevention program developed in Wilkes County, NC, is also a public health model based on the twin premises that overdose deaths are preventable and that all communities are responsible for their own health. Davie County adopted this model and established a committee to monitor overdose statistics and educate the community on substance use prevention and proper medication disposal. With grant funding from Project Lazarus, Davie County's Project Lazarus committee purchased three medication drop boxes for the collection and disposal of unused opioids and other medications. Davie County Sheriff's Office ensures medication drop boxes are emptied and medication is destroyed. Project Lazarus has collected and destroyed several hundred pounds of medication. Davie County EMS carries Naloxone on all EMS vehicles and has trained the majority of local law enforcement agencies to administer this lifesaving overdose reversal medication.


Rate of Unintentional Medication & Drug Deaths by County per 100,000 North Carolina Residents, 2012-2016



Oral Health

The following services were provided to Davie County students. Services were organized and provided by Beckie Boulton, Public Health Dental Hygienist employed by the N. C. Oral Health Section. This is a wonderful program that is able to reach children that probably wouldn't have the access to this care.

Chapter 6 – Community Concerns and Priorities

The community health assessment committee reviewed primary and secondary data and identified recurring themes to develop three priority areas. The chosen priorities are:

- Chronic disease management
- Drug misuse and abuse prevention and education
- Access to affordable care.

In addition to primary data collection from community residents surveyed, the assessment team obtained various data points and trend information from secondary statistical sources. Secondary data provided additional information about the health and well-being of those living in Davie County. Only current and relevant data were used to create the assessment. The primary source of health related data was N.C. State Center for Health Statistics (NC SCHS). The NC SCHS compiles morbidity incidence and prevalence as well as mortality data. Health and social data is contained in the County Data Book, which is updated each year. Data from the CHA survey and all other sources helped the committee determine priority areas to be addressed.

Priority Area 1: Chronic Disease Management:

Chronic disease management is proactive, organized sets of interventions focused on the needs of a population. Chronic disease management programs can support patients with illnesses such as diabetes, hypertension, and heart failure and can be delivered in various health care settings.

Davie County's top three leading causes of death continue to be Cancer, Diseases of the Heart, and Cerebrovascular Disease. Cerebrovascular Disease includes stroke, carotid stenosis, vertebral stenosis and intracranial stenosis, aneurysms and vascular malformations.

Davie County Community Health Assessment survey results for questions about individuals residing in households that have chronic diseases show: 40% of respondents report someone in the household has arthritis; 36% reported having someone in the household with Diabetes; 30% with asthma; 17% with heart disease; 14% with mental illness; 10% with cancer. When asked about getting the recommended amount of physical activity each week, Davie County survey results show: 38% of survey participants responded that time was the main reason for not receiving recommended physical activity. 5% indicated it was too costly to receive recommended physical activity. When asked about getting the recommended nutrition intake each week, results show: 18% of Davie respondents indicated fruits and vegetables were too expensive; 16% indicated fruits and vegetables would go bad before the respondent could eat them; and 12% reported not having time to prepare them.

It is well documented that chronic diseases account for more than half of all deaths in NC. The number of individuals with diabetes and obesity continues to increase. Behavioral risk factors like physical inactivity and poor management of blood sugar, cholesterol, and general nutrition significantly (and negatively) impact health. By addressing factors that influence chronic diseases and monitoring relative biometrics through screening and programmatic measures, positive health outcomes can be achieved.

Priority Area 2: Drug Misuse and Abuse Prevention and Education:

Drug misuse is defined as the use of prescription drugs without a prescription or in a manner other than as directed by a doctor, including use without a prescription of one's own; use in greater amounts, more often, or longer than told to take a drug; or use in any other way not directed by a doctor. Each day more than 1000 people are treated in hospital emergency departments for not misusing prescription opioids. (CDC.gov) Abuse is defined as dependence on a legal or illegal drug or medication.

“An epidemic of unintentional poisoning deaths continues to affect North Carolina. Since 1999, the number of these deaths has increased by more than 391 percent, from 279 to 1,370 in 2015. The vast majority of unintentional deaths are drug or medication-related, occurring when people misuse or abuse these drugs. In particular, opioid analgesic deaths involving medications such as methadone, oxycodone, and hydrocodone have increased significantly in North Carolina. Opioid analgesics are involved in more drug deaths than cocaine and heroin combined but that seems to be changing rapidly” (injuryfreenc.ncdhhs.gov)

38% of Davie County Community Health Assessment survey respondents indicated substance abuse prevention education was needed.

Access to Affordable Care

Davie County survey respondents indicated access to care, including mental, dental and prenatal care, was the biggest challenge faced.

Davie County ranks 24th in the state (out of 100 counties) for access to care – the ratio of patients to provider for primary care physicians, dentists and mental health providers as compared to the state ratio is significant.


The Institute of Medicine states that attaining good access to care requires three discrete steps:

- 1) Gaining entry into the health care system, which means **having insurance**
- 2) Getting access to sites of care where patients can receive needed services. This means finding providers that will accept the **type of insurance** each person has (Medicaid, MedCost, United Healthcare, Aetna, BCBS, etc.); finding a provider that **accepts new patients**; finding a provider that **accepts no insurance or allows fee for service payments from the uninsured**; finding providers and hospitals that are accessible with **no transportation source or limited transportation sources, or those unable to drive due to disabilities**; finding providers with **interpreter or advanced communication services** for individuals with hearing or speech impairments, or those speaking languages not common to this area.
- 3) Finding providers who meet the needs of individual patients. **Are there enough providers/specialists** to meet the health needs of the community/population (doctors, dentists/orthodontists, oncologists, gynecologists, psychiatrists, etc.); **Are there accommodations for working individuals** in the form of extended hours; **does the community know** where to find providers or specialists and/or whether or not specialists are “accessible”?

Everything mentioned above must be considered when discussing or working to improve access to care.



1. How old are you?





2. Race (mark all that apply)





3. What is the highest level of education that you completed?





4. How many people does your income support?





5. How many people live in your home?





6. What is your marital status?





7. What zip code do you currently reside in?





8. As a Davie County citizen, what is the biggest challenge you and your family members face?





9. Where do you get most of your health-related information?







11. In your opinion, which of the health behaviors do people in your own community need more information about?







13. Are you and your family up-to-date on your vaccinations (required shots)?





14. If you or your family are not up-to-date on your vaccinations (required shots), what is the main reason?





15. Which of these recommended health screenings have you had in the last year?





16. Where do you usually go for healthcare when you are sick? (Choose one)




87% of respondents reported going to a private doctor (PCP) when sick; 9% report going to urgent care; and another 6% report going to the hospital when sick.

17. Do you or anyone in your household have any of the chronic conditions listed below?





18. If you identified conditions in question 17, are you being monitored or receiving treatment for those conditions?





19. Have you or a family member had difficulties getting services for mental or behavioral health in Davie County?





20. If a friend or family member needed help and/or counseling for suicide prevention, who would you tell them to contact?





21. In your opinion, what is the biggest substance abuse problem in this county?





22. Do you currently use tobacco products? (this includes cigarettes, chew, dip, snuff)





23. Do you currently use vaping products (e-cigs, vape pen, vape mod, etc.)





24. If you currently use tobacco or vaping products, where would you go for help if you wanted to quit?





25. Do you use any of the following safety measures in your home?







27. During the past week, how many days did you or another family member read to your child (age 0-6 years old)?





28. If you have children and can't find adequate child care, what is the main reason?





29. How would you prefer to receive county-wide urgent information? (choose one)





30. In the event of a public health emergency (i.e. Anthrax attack) what do you see as a limitation?





31. Do you have an emergency survival kit (water, flashlight, batteries, etc.) in your home?





32. Do you have any suggestions or recommendations that the Davie County Health Department could do to make our community a better place?




85% of respondents had no recommendations for ways the health department could make the community a better place.
